

PRESENTATION

Barb VanDrasek has been called to serve as pastor of Gethsemane Lutheran Church in Minneapolis, Minnesota. The candidate for ordination is presented to the presiding minister and to the assembly.

Barb is presented by Brittany Schiebe, president of the congregation.

I present for ordination to the ministry of word and sacrament Barb VanDrasek, who has been prepared, examined, and approved for this ministry and who has been called by the church to this ministry through Gethsemane Lutheran Church.

ADDRESS AND QUESTIONS

B All baptized Christians are called to share in Christ's ministry of love and service in the world, to the glory of God and for the sake of the human family and the whole creation.

According to apostolic usage you are now to be entrusted with the office of word and sacrament in the one holy catholic church by the laying on of hands and by prayer.

Charges concerning the use of the means of grace

A reading from John: Jesus said, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you. Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained." (*John 20:21-23*)

A reading from Matthew: Jesus said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:18-20)

A reading from First Corinthians: I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

(1 Corinthians 11:23-26)

- B Before almighty God, to whom you must give account, and in the presence of this assembly, I ask:
 Will you assume this office,
 believing that the church's call is God's call to the ministry of word and sacrament?
- \blacksquare I will, and I ask God to help me.
- B The church in which you are to be ordained confesses that the holy scriptures are the word of God and are the norm of its faith and life.

 We accept, teach, and confess the Apostles', the Nicene, and the Athanasian Creeds.

 We also acknowledge the Lutheran confessions as true witnesses and faithful expositions of the holy scriptures. Will you therefore preach and teach in accordance with the holy scriptures and these creeds and confessions?
- **I** will, and I ask God to help me.
- Will you be diligent in your study of the holy scriptures and faithful in your use of the means of grace?
 Will you pray for God's people,
 nourish them with the word and sacraments,
 and lead them by your own example in faithful service and holy living?
- **I** will, and I ask God to help me.
- Will you give faithful witness in the world, that God's love may be known in all that you do?
- I will, and I ask God to help me.
- B Almighty God, who has given you the will to do these things, graciously give you the strength and compassion to perform them.
- **A** Amen.

Rostered leaders are invited forward to participate in the laying on of hands The candidate for ordination kneels.

THANKSGIVING

- **B** The Lord be with you.
- **M** And also with you.
- **B** Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.
- It is right to give our thanks and praise.
- B Holy God, holy and mighty, holy and immortal, we bless you for your infinite love in Christ our Lord, in whom we have redemption and forgiveness of sins according to the riches of his grace.
 We thank you that by his death your Son overcame death, and that, raised by your mighty power, he gives us new life.
 We praise you that, having ascended into heaven, Christ pours out his gifts abundantly on the church, making some apostles, some prophets, some pastors and teachers, to equip your people for their work of ministry for building up the body of Christ.

The bishop lays both hands on the head of the candidate for ordination.

Other rostered leaders participating in the laying on of hands join the bishop.

The assembly keeps a time of silent prayer.

Finally, the bishop prays:

- B Eternal God, through your Son, Jesus Christ, pour out your Holy Spirit upon Barb and fill her with the gifts of grace for the ministry of word and sacrament. Bless her proclamation of your word and administration of your sacraments, so that your church may be gathered for praise and strengthened for service.

 Make her a faithful pastor, patient teacher, and wise counselor.

 Grant that in all things she may serve without reproach, that your people may be renewed and your name be glorified in the church; through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.
- **A** Amen.

GIVING OF A STOLE

A stole is placed over the candidate's shoulders. Then the bishop says:

B Receive this stole as a sign of your work, and live in obedience to the Lord Jesus, serving his people and remembering his promise: "Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." (Matthew 11:28-30)

CHARGES FROM THE MINISTERIUM

The candidate for ordination stands. Scripture passages are addressed to the candidate.

Hear the words of the apostles: Pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, love, endurance, gentleness. Fight the good fight of the faith; take hold of the eternal life to which you were called. (1 Timothy 6:11-12)

And again: Take heed to yourselves and to all the flock, in which the Holy Spirit has made you guardians, to feed the church of God that he obtained with the blood of his own Son. (Acts 20:28)

And again: Tend the flock of God that is in your charge, not under compulsion but willingly, not for sordid gain but eagerly. Do not lord it over those in your charge, but be examples to the flock. And when the chief shepherd appears, you will win the crown of glory that never fades away.

(1 Peter 5:2-4)

And again: Think of us in this way, as servants of Christ and stewards of God's mysteries. Moreover, it is required of stewards that they be found trustworthy. (1 Corinthians 4:1-2)

BLESSING

- Barb, care for God's people, bear their burdens, and do not betray their confidence.

 So discipline yourself in life and teaching that you preserve the truth, giving no occasion for false security or illusory hope.

 Witness faithfully in word and deed to all people.

 Give and receive comfort as you serve within the church.

 And be of good courage, for God has called you, and your labor in the Lord is not in vain.
- B The God of peace, who brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, the great shepherd of the sheep, by the blood of the eternal covenant, make you complete in everything good so that you may do God's will, working in you that which is pleasing in God's sight; through Jesus Christ, to whom be the glory forever and ever.
- A Amen.

ACCLAMATION BY THE ASSEMBLY

- B Will you, assembled as the people of God and speaking for the whole church, receive Barb as a messenger of Jesus Christ, sent by God to serve all people with the gospel of hope and salvation? Will you regard her as a servant of Christ?
- Me will, and we ask God to help us.
- B Will you pray for her, help and honor her for her work's sake, and in all things strive to live together in the peace and unity of Christ?
- Me will, and we ask God to help us.
- B Let it be acclaimed that Barb VanDrasek is a called and ordained minister in the church of Christ. She has Christ's authority to preach the word of God and administer the sacraments, serving God's people as together we bear God's creative and redeeming love to all the world.
- M Amen. Thanks be to God.



FROM THE ORDINAND

Over the past weeks my heart has been full, as I have thought of the many people who have walked beside me, or led, or pushed from behind, to keep me going to this day. Some are still with me, some now at a distance, and some are present in spirit. I cherish them all, as I recall our times together, and the gifts each one has shared. All of them have contributed to my learning, growth, and preparation for ministry. Of course, the people of Central loom largest in the formation of my pastoral identity: the pastors, the staff, and the congregation. I am grateful for all of the support and the opportunities for growth that I have been given by my church. And, I am grateful to God for all of you.

As I look forward, the path inclines gently upward. It'll be a climb, as I grow into my ministry in my first call at Gethsemane. It's interesting, though, how God keeps putting people in my path who carry me along. So, I trust that God will provide all that I need to be worthy of the title, *pastor*.

Did you know that the ELCA provides a job description for pastors? It includes: preach the Word; administer the sacraments; conduct public worship; provide pastoral care; and speak publicly to the world in solidarity with the poor and oppressed, calling for justice and proclaiming God's love for the world. And, my personal favorite: *strive to extend the Kingdom of God*.

This is a daunting list of responsibilities. Embedded within each of them is the deep work of relationship that is the foundation of all ministry. Above all, ordination is a *humbling* experience. To be ordained means to enter into a sacred trust with the people of God, and to remain worthy of that trust in all things. It is a privilege to be allowed into people's lives in the ways that pastors are allowed in. When the Bishop asks, "Will you...?" my first thought may be, "Well, I'll *try*...". But, God is faithful, and I will continue to trust in that. So, I'm ready. When the Bishop asks, "Will you...?" I'll reply, "I will, and I ask God to help me."
